Popes Valley Road Repair Work by Carl Peterson

Your board tries its best to keep up with needed road repairs in our neighborhood. For the past three years it has been keeping an eye on the severe erosion potentially impacting the integrity of the road bed on Popes Valley Drive about 150 yards west of the intersection with Rusina Road. The first time we called it in was August of 2014. Storm water eroded the soil on the north side of the road up to the guard rail posts. After we called it in, the city filled the eroded space with dirt and covered it with asphalt. That lasted three years, until it began eroding again. Your board contacted the city this summer and asked that the eroded area be fixed again. This time, the city filled the eroded area with dirt, and covered it with boulders, some of which were about three feet in diameter. To top off the repair, the city covered the rocks with 12 ½ cubic yards of concrete. It looks like this repair will last a while.







Plea to Control Mullein Weeds by Bob Reiman

What's a mullein? That's what 90% of the Pinecliff residents say when I raise the subject of getting rid of these weeds on their Pine Cliff property. A Mullein (Common) is an invasive, noxious, non-native weed that has been placed on the Department of Agriculture's List C for containment. They have large, broad soft, fuzzy, grey-green leaves, can be anywhere from 2' to 7' tall, and are widely seen along Colorado's roadsides. It is clear that they are now making their presence felt in our neighborhoods.

Why should we care? These invasive weeds displace more desirable plants and compete with them for resources and



they are spreading at an alarming rate. They have no natural enemies since they were introduced years ago from Europe. Nature needs a hand from us.

What can we do? Since it is late in their season, if you have one or more around your property, get a pair of clippers or heavy shears, cut the yellow/ green head off, put it in a plastic bag, and dispose of it in your weekly trash. DON'T throw it on the ground! That is the equivalent of planting it for next year. I have found many, many of them between properties where owners don't even take notice of them. There are many on the steep slope between Golden Hills Road and Popes Valley Drive. This isn't going to be easy, but if we work on this together, we can make a significant difference in our future natural environment. This is the first step of what is probably a multi-year effort.

Thank you, all for participating in the Pinecliff Homeowners' Association (PHOA) Trash Service program with Bestway Disposal! What a year we have had!! We currently have 444 households participating in program! If you do not have service currently or want to make changes to your existing service, please visit the PHOA website at www.pinecliff-hoa.com. A few reminders:

- * With fall quickly approaching, please remember that our service level with Bestway includes <u>two</u> extra bags per week. If you have been busy raking and have extra bags that you wish to be picked up, please contact Bestway Disposal @ (719) 633-8709 ahead of time to make arrangements for the extra pickup. If no prior arrangements have been made, only two bags will be taken.
- * If you have recycling service, please take extra care to *only put recyclables in the recycling bin*. Bestway has single stream recycling and having non-recyclable items in the stream creates problems and requires extra manpower to remove the trash items.
- * Please put your bins out in the morning for pickup, not the night before. The bears and other critters are out, and we do not want to encourage their feeding on trash.
- * In the event that the following holidays New Year's Day, Thanksgiving Day, or Christmas Day fall on a Tuesday, trash removal will occur on the next day.

Your current trash service runs through 2/28/18. Watch for information in January 2018 for continuing service through the PHOA.

End of the Year Bank Account Balances

Below are the end of the year balances in the PHOA bank accounts for fiscal years 2015, 2016, and 2017. It shows a substantial increase from the previous year primarily due to the continued increase in membership. In addition to these accounts, the PHOA also uses separate checking and savings accounts for the Trash Service funds. Because we collect a full year of payments from all participants at the beginning of the annual cycle, the cash in these accounts reached as high as \$72K in 2017 and will drain down to about \$2,000 by the end of the current cycle.

Last Saturday I joined members of the Friends of Ute Valley Park group, and the Trails and Open Space coalition for a hike around the new East Loop trail. It was a spectacular day, and the first time out for many in the group on this great new trail. During the hike, we conversed about the park, its trails, wildflowers, views, and overall beauty. There was one special moment on the hike when I stopped to take a photo and the view - along with the overall hike experience - brought me to this second definition of the word "appreciation" Standing in the middle of our city on a sunny morning, I was suddenly swimming in the deep end of the pool of appreciation.

It reminded me of Bill Ruskin, the former superintendent of design and development for the Colorado Springs Parks Department. That property would ultimately become Hewlett Packard and their land has now been acquired to add to Ute Valley Park. Plus, countless amounts of monies that were donated to make it all happen.

That is a just a quick flash review of the assembly of the park property. There was also a ton of planning, followed by thousands of hours of hard work - many done by volunteers - that were invested to create this amazing space. Add to that hundreds more volunteer work hours that happen every year to keep it available for our use and enjoyment.

Moving forward I hope that you experience a wider variety and high number of moments of gratitude in your days. Some of those moments may happen while on a visit to Ute Valley Park for a hike, or maybe a quick bike ride after work. If so I would ask that the next time you are back in UVP that you please take a moment to stop, look, and listen to have a deeper appreciation of everything put forth by so many to make Ute Valley Park a very special place.

Annual Meeting Elections by Bruce Hutchison

Below are the key points from the PHOA bylaws on how members of the board of directors are nominated and elected:

- The number of directors serving on the PHOA board at any one time is 5 minimum and 11 maximum
- Board members are usually elected at PHOA's September Annual Meeting and serve for 2 year terms starting January 1st of the following year (i.e. Jan. 1, 2018)
- If a board vacancy occurs before the end of a term, a qualified replacement is appointed via a majority vote of the current board of directors. Replacements serve on the board through the remainder of the original term.
- A nominating committee selected by the president selects qualified HOA members who agree to be listed on the annual meeting election ballot. Only one nominee for each vacant board position is allowed.
- During the election portion of the annual meeting, "other nominations may be made from the floor by any active member."
- The first meeting of the newly constituted board of directors must be held within 30 days following the date of assuming office, which is January 1st.
- The HOA officers shall be, President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer and shall be <u>elected by a majority vote of the board of directors</u>, at the first meeting of the newly constituted board of directors. Each officer shall serve a term of one year or until his successor shall have been duly elected. Officers, if re-elected, may succeed themselves.

At the end of this year, both Lisa Taskerud and Tony Jacobs will be stepping down from the board after serving admirably for 6 and 2 years respectively. Thus at the Sept. 28th annual meeting, we hope to elect 2 new board members for 2 year terms. 
